Harnessing the power of clinical and financial collaboration to drive value 22 March 2018, London (venue tbc)

The concept of 'value' in healthcare – maximising the outcomes which matter to people at the lowest possible cost – is increasingly seen as a key lever for supporting the delivery of high quality sustainable healthcare. The challenge is how to do this in practice. What is clear is that clinicians and finance staff need to work more closely together to support improvements in value.

In this forum we will be focusing on how clinicians can advance value-based healthcare, both in their clinical roles and by working collaboratively with their finance colleagues. We will explore the main elements of value through a series of real-life case studies, and consider how collaborative working between clinicians and finance can drive value.

This one-day forum is aimed at all clinical staff with an interest in quality improvement, the effective use of resources and the practical implementation of value-based healthcare. We encourage clinicians to bring a finance colleague with them if possible.

The importance of clinical and financial collaboration and what we mean by value.

10:15 Capturing value in healthcare

Paul Buss, medical director and deputy chief executive, Aneurin Bevan University Health Board

The use of a value-based approach at Aneurin Bevan University Health Board (ABUHB) is driven by a joint clinical and finance partnership between the health board's medical director, assistant medical director, and finance director. All are supporters of a value-based healthcare model as a way of supporting the delivery of high-quality sustainable services for the local population.

In this session Paul will give an overview of the work undertaken at ABUHB and introduce the theory of value-based healthcare. He will talk about why value in healthcare matters, clinicians' responsibility for resource utilisation, and the importance of clinical and financial collaboration.

12:00 How Quality Improvement (QI) links to the value-based healthcare agenda John Dean, clinical director for quality improvement and patient safety, Care Quality Improvement Department, Royal College of Physicians

John will provide an introduction to Quality Improvement (QI) and give an overview of some of the different approaches to service redesign. The session will also look at how QI links to the measurement and realisation of value including identifying some of the challenges to success and sharing details of progress from existing QI projects. The session will cover what you can do within your own organisation and how to take account of the value equation when taking on QI projects.

13:40 Following the patient – linking costs and outcomes for prostate cancer pathways Susan Rollason, director of finance and a representative from the UHCW clinical staff, University Hospitals Coventry and Warwickshire NHS Trust

University Hospitals Coventry and Warwickshire NHS Trust (UHCW) is undertaking a wide programme of work to promote value-based healthcare, and as part of this is starting to develop the capability to measure and understand its health outcomes in prostate cancer care delivery, using the framework prescribed by the International Collaboration for Health Outcomes Measurement (ICHOM).

This session will explore their approach, progress so far and plans for the future. Previously at the trust a range of clinically rich datasets were being collected, but were not being used in any meaningful way. In particular, the trust was missing the opportunity to link outcome data to finance and activity data held within their Patient Level Information and Costing System (PLICS) to gain a better understanding of the economics of service delivery.

UHCW has now been working with clinicians and managers to start mapping patient outcome data for the Prostate Cancer pathway, with the aim to then map it through to patient-level costing data in order to gauge value adding and non-value adding activities.

14:30 The practical application of value in healthcare

15:30 Patient-defined outcomes and population health management Caroline Sayer, former Chair, Camden Clinical Commissioning Group

Delivering value-based healthcare in practice will only progress so far if the work is conducted in silos. Eventually we will require an integrated system-wide approach that bridges the gap between outcomes/cost for the individual patient, and population health management. Camden CCG has been strongly influenced

by Michael Porter's work suggesting that an outcome defined by patients in itself could drive the integration of care, particularly if it requires a system approach across organisations.

The CCG has developed its own population health management tool to identify segments of population by developing groups based on similar health needs. The aim is to understand what drives patients to fit into one of the groups, for example a combination of disease and demographic factors. Caroline will outline how they have developed local outcomes directly with patients and used the population health management tool to re-design services based on the needs of the population, which can then be measured in success by the related outcomes and cost.
