Who are they?

The Care Quality Commission is the **independent regulator of health and adult social care** in England. They make sure health and social care services provide people with safe, effective, compassionate, highquality care and encourage care services to improve.

What do they do?

The roles of the CQC: **Register** care providers; **monitor**, **inspect** and **rate** services; **take** action to protect **people** who use services (enforcement); **speak** with an **independent** voice; publishing regional and national views of the major quality issues in health and social care.



There are five questions asked of all care services, at the heart of the way the CQC regulates and focuses on the things that matter to people. The CQC ask the same five questions of all the services inspected:

- Are they **safe**?
- Are they **effective**?
- Are they caring?

- Are they responsive to people's needs?
- Are they **well-led**?

A regulator monitors the quality of a service in the public or private sector. As a Government regulator, the CQC is sponsored by, but **independent of, the Government**. They are a **statutory body**, within the Health and Social Care Act 2008, and **a public body**, **exercising powers on behalf of the public**. The CQC cannot step outside the prescribed functions and powers.
